### **HOA II Board Meeting**

The board met on Monday February 18, 2013. This was the first meeting of the 2013 board.

After routine business was handled, Bob Morris reported on membership. He said that we have 272 paid members out of a possible 583. He compared this to 2005 when we had 437 paid members.

Because we have a smaller board, we have asked for volunteers to handle some of the jobs previously done by board members. John & Maura Alexander will assist Marge Strauch as our FMO representative and report at the board meetings. Lellian Thibideau will be our membership chairman and chair a committee made up of Donna Schneider, Jim Walsh, and Chuck Flower. This committee will also report at the board meetings.

Judy Hale reviewed with the board the updated 'Five-year plan' which will be discussed with our Regional Manager at the next liaison meeting. This plan reflects requests and complaints received by the board over the last few years.

Ruth Walsh asked why screws were not used instead of nails when constructing/repairing the golf cart bridges. It has been determined that the quality of the wood is bad; screws would probably not do any better job than the nails.

A discussion was initiated by Bob Morris about alligators due to a recent incident by his house. Residents are reminded that only ELS representatives may call animal control to have an alligator removed. Large or aggressive alligators should be reported to the office. DO NO FEED ANY WILD LIFE, including Feral cats.

Bob Morris reported on the recent blanket collection drive for

### Liaison Meeting

New mulch was added to the cart parking areas by the tennis and bocce courts. It was asked why cement was not used. Ed said cement was not thought of at the time; others commented that cement could also affect drainage.

New benches were installed around the shuffleboard courts. These benches are heavy duty and much stronger than the old benches.

Fence around the hot tub areas was rebuilt. Residents have been changing the hot tub temperature. The hot tub temperature is set at the Florida Board of Health's recommended temperature and should not be changed.

The outdoor shower by the hot tub was rebuilt.

Eight additional stop signs have been installed throughout the community.

Cart path and walking path seams have been ground down to make the paths more level.

A new weir gate was installed at the end of the lake by culde-sac 62.

45 notices were sent to residents whose homes either need to be power washed or need yard work.

An estimate to have the storm sewers inspected via cameras was presented. Ed will follow up with the group investigating this problem.

The new mats around the pool seem to be collecting mold.

Non-residents and long-term guests using our amenities was discussed. The lease land residents prospectus provides for fees to be charged in these cases. Ed will talk to ELS management about this problem.

Dogs were again a topic of discussion. Problems with barking dogs and dogs not on leashes were discussed. Lee County ordinances say that all dogs must be on leashes when owners are walking them.

The upcoming pictorial directory was discussed.

The liaison meetings are held the second Wednesday of each month. Residents are encouraged to talk to the board members about issues they wish to have discussed.

The Annual Members' Meeting of the Pine Lakes Estates Homeowners' Association was held on February 11, 2013. President, Bill Smith opened the official portion of the meeting at 7:00 PM.

Bill thanked the Board Members for their help and support during the last year.

Lou Ackley advised that there were a total of 121 proxies received and attendees. Enough to satisfy a quorum.

Secretary, Karen Fauci read the Proof of Notice of Meeting certifying that the notice to all members, either by hand or mail delivery was completed. The notice was certified by a Notary Public and posted on the bulletin board as required.

The Minutes for the 2012 Annual Meeting were read and approved.

Marlo Magnette read the Treasurer's Report. She advised that we now have six homes in various stages of foreclosure:

- 2-F Some bank activity, foreclosure being finalized
- 6-F No bank activity
- 17-0 No bank activity
- 26K Lawyers starting correspondence with bank.
- 7-D Newly delinquent

Marlo advised that the balance for 2012 is \$9,000 less that 2011 due to our need to pay the fees on abandoned homes and meet our commitment to ELS. Motion was made to accept Treasurer's Report and seconded.

The following requests were submitted and approved by the Architectural Review Committee:

- 2-l Add patio
- 7-L Paint shutters, turn car-port into a garage
- 8-N Paint entire house
- 21-C Paint garage door
- 22-C Paint shutters and driveway

### **Nominating Committee**

Lou Ackley thanked Pat Hampson, Deb Sawall, Shirley Baster, Arlene Stoecker and Chuck Yedinak for their assistance working the registration tables. Lou also remembered Norm Suski and all the years he gave as Nominating Coordinator.

Lou introduced Charles Kromas and Charles Matthews, the two candidates running for office. They then gave a brief bio and their thoughts on why they thought is was important to be part of the Board.

There was a request for nominations from the floor. There were none given. Nominations were closed.

Attendees were then asked to vote and sign the Waiver for Financial Audit as well as the candidates ballot. Candidates voted in. Results of waiver: 107 in favor, 4 opposed and a few with no signatures.

### **President's Report**

Estate and Lease Project Track forms have been reinitiated. This allows the Boards to stay on top of what projects are and are not being either worked on or completed.

November 12, 2012 Meet and Greet was a great success and it is hoped that it can be done again before season comes to an end.

Tiki huts will be re-varnished during the Summer of 2013 and fire retardant applied in October.

Lighting may be added to the walkway/cart path leading to bridge going to Eagle Trace.

Beautification Committee notified management of maintenance needs on golf course and most projects were completed.

### **Audience concerns/requests**

Question raised about HOA II doing the inspections of pool, golf course, tennis courts, etc. Member was advised that whatever information they compile is then brought back to the Liason meetings where it is reviewed.

Additional concern was raised as to how long it should take once a complaint is registered at the front desk for management action to be taken. We were not able to answer the questions but advised that if homeowner is not happy with the lack of action with their request, that they should bring it to the Board's attention.

Concern about the lack of progress on the perimeter fence around Circle Pine was expressed. This is on-going project and progress has been slow due to lack of workers.

Homeowner asked about the steps that should be taken if they are interested in an abandoned home. They were advised that until a bank has taken it over and listed it with a Realtor that there is very little that can be done.

Audience was advised that the weirs have been fixed and hopefully will resolve the problem of the lakes receding more than necessary.

### **Other Business**

Bill Smith was thanked for his committed dedication while serving as Vice President and President on the PLEHOA Board. His availability to other Board members and homeowners has been more than appreciated.

Homeowners are asked to seriously consider serving as part of the PLEHOA Board. There will be three positions open in 2014 and it is extremely important that there continue to be people who are willing to serve as representatives of their community so that the contractual agreements that we have with ELS are maintained.

The MARCH meeting will be on Monday, March 11th instead of Wednesday, March 13th as the meeting room is not available on Wednesday.

No further business was brought up. Bill thanked everyone for their attendance and asked for motion to close meeting. Motion was made and seconded. Meeting adjourned at 7:45.

### FMO – Our Pine Lakes Voice in Tallahassee

FMO Legislative Counsel, Nancy Black Stewart, is our voice in Tallahassee and she is sponsored by FMO dues (Federation of Manufactured Home Owners of Florida, Inc.). The FMO bill this legislature session, if passed, will solve the problem with Citizens Property Insurance Corporation as they attempt to downsize the number of those insured and eliminate coverage on attachments to your homes. Those people carrying private insurance should also be interested in the passage of this FMO sponsored bill as private companies may copy the exclusions in Citizens.

Are you thinking of selling your home? If the buyer cannot obtain adequate insurance, he/she may not be able to get enough financing to complete the purchase. The buyer may then be legally able to back out of the sale.

Would you have liked an increase of six percent on your monthly rent? Not to worry, especially if you are supporting FMO. During last year's legislative session, FMO was instrumental in tabling a bill that would have added Florida State Sales Tax to your monthly rent. Join FMO so they can continue to stop such bills from passing into law. Remember, that bill was tabled and therefore may be brought up again but without your support, FMO may not be around to protect your interests.

FMO is the only organization in the State of Florida that watches out for our rights under Florida Statute 723. FMO dues help finance our lobbyist, Nancy Black Stewart, who watches for bills that are not in our interest and educates representatives about our life style. FMO dues provide attorneys who argue our rights under FS 723. FMO lawyers will support you and your community in a conflict with community owners. With FMO membership comes a bi-monthly magazine FMOnews and information about an affordable emergency road service plan, Cross County Motor Club, \$30 additional per year.

It is in your best interest to join FMO today! The cost of membership is \$22 per year, or \$55 for three years. # A Short Description of the Vietnam War Memorial

Interesting Veterans Statistics off the Vietnam Memorial

\*There are 58,267 names now listed on that polished black wall, including those added in 2010;

\*The names are arranged in the order in which they were taken from us by date and within each date the names are alphabetized. It is hard to believe it is 30 years since the last casualties.

\*The first known casualty was Richard B. Fitzgibbon of North Weymouth, Mass. Listed by the U.S. Department of Defense as having been killed on June 8, 1956. His name is listed on the Wall with that of his son, Marine Corp. Lance Cpt. Richard B. Fitzgibbon III, who was killed on September 7, 1965.

- There are three sets of fathers and sons on the Wall.
- 39,996 on the Wall were just 22 years old or younger.
- 8,283 were just 19 years old.
- The largest age group, 33,103, were 18 years old.
- Twelve soldiers on the Wall were 17 years old.
- 997 soldiers were killed on their first day in Vietnam.
- 1,448 soldiers were killed on their last day in Vietnam.

### Pine Lakes Theater

With sadness Pine Lakes Theater's 2013 play "The Sunshine Boys" by Neil Simon has been cancelled. Our leading actor, Rogers Hamilton, had a stroke and is now working to rebuild his life. Early in his 70 years acting history Rogers was in "Heloise" with Alan Arkin in the Village Gate Off Broadway Theater in New York. Alan was the original Broadway director of "The Sunshine Boys." Here is a little history of Rogers Hamilton's early years in show business in Rogers and Debbie's own words.

Fifty-six years ago in 1957, two starving young actors worked together in an Off-Broadway drama named "Heloise" at the Old Village Gate Theater on the corner of First Avenue and Tenth Street on the Lower East Side of Manhattan. The play was a success and ran for seven months before closing. One of them was Alan Arkin, who directed the original Broadway Production of "The Sunshine Boys" and the other one Rogers Hamilton, who is playing Willie Clark in the Pine Lakes Theater production of the play that was to be presented on March 29, 30, and 31.

Rogers said: "I had no idea Alan had directed the play on Broadway until we received the scripts and I saw it in the credits there and it brought back a flood of old memories. We did eight shows a week; two shows on Sunday, dark on Monday. On Sundays, in the break between shows, Alan and I usually played cards to pass the time between performances. I don't know what he earned for a salary, but I received the huge sum of 35 dollars a week. He lived with his wife in Brooklyn and they had just had a baby, so I'm sure times were tough for them too."

At one point in "The Sunshine Boys" there is a line referring to "Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt...." When Rogers read that line he said, "I wonder if Alan helped Neil Simon write that line? One night Mrs. Roosevelt came to see "Heloise" and after the performance, we met and shook hands with that dear old lady. I still remember that moment fondly, and I bet Alan does as well."

Debbie Hamilton, our Director, will be helping Rogers with his therapy and many doctor visits. We all wish Rogers and Debbie well in the task ahead.

# Your Social Security and Medicare

Will harmful proposals make a comeback in the 113th congress?

Proposal #I - "Reduce the Social Security COLA (Cost of Living Adjustment)" - If passed, this proposal would immediately impose a benefit cut to current retirees through adoption of the "Chained" Consumer Price Index (CPI). This is nothing more than a benefit cut masquerading as a technical change. What does that mean? In fact, the chained CPI would permanently cut COLAs for generations of retirees and the disabled, including everyone already receiving benefits, making it increasingly difficult for beneficiaries to make ends meet. Switching to the chained CPI would cut benefits by \$208 billion over ten years. \$112 billion of those benefit cuts would come from Social Security alone with up to \$24 billion coming from Veteran's benefits and military retirement pay cuts.

Proposal #II - "Raise Medicare premiums" - While some higher income Medicare beneficiaries already pay more than the normal premium, this proposal would dramatically expand the number of beneficiaries required to pay higher premiums. Part "D" premiums, which vary widely by plan and region, would also rise at about the same rate. This would spell disaster for the millions of seniors who struggle to afford premiums at the current rate – especially elderly and disabled single persons with low incomes hovering around \$15,000.

Proposal #III - "Raise the Medicare eligibility age to 67" - This would increase overall health spending and shift costs to seniors, states and employers.

Since 1965, America's seniors have counted on receiving Medicare at age 65. But now, raising the Medicare age of eligibility would affect all Americans, including those who are already over the age of 67 who would end up paying higher premiums as a result of the change.

Proposal #IV - "Reduce Social Security benefits for workers making as little as \$11,000."

In fact, several proposals have attempted to change the benefit computation formula in an effort to make it less generous to high wage earners. However, the proposed changes affect all workers and reduce benefits for workers earning as little as 11 thousand dollars per year.





The first document mentioned was a will. Upon a person's demise, a will goes to probate, which can take 12-18 months to settle. If a person can no longer make decisions, a power of attorney needs to be appointed to make these decisions. A durable power of attorney can also make decisions if a person becomes disabled. Because Florida changed its laws a few years ago, a will may have to be updated.

According to the state of Florida, medical directives, such as a living will and designation of a healthcare surrogate, should be updated every 24 months. A trust is a holding container for all assets. A living trust is the same as a revocable trust. It's flexible so it can be changed at any time. Most assets can be placed in a trust. A trust does not go to probate.

Many questions were answered during this very informative talk. Refreshments were then served.

Maryanna McCarthy spoke about ACT. She brought 86 bags of clothes to the shelter for abused women and their children. ACT takes out what the women can use and the rest goes to the Second ACT Thrift Shop to sell. If you are able to donate, please keep toiletries separate from clothing. You can bring items to 17E on Eagle Trace Ct. Barbara Curley, who brought toys at Christmas to ACT, spoke about the need for items because ACT's government funding has been cut by \$50,000. They need diapers, wipes, baby shampoo, gently used children's clothing (for ages two and older), washcloths, towels, twin sheets and blankets, and new children's underwear. These can be donated to Barbara's house at 44F Mangrove Bay. Pat Rothoff suggested we have a baby shower after the April meeting. 

## Did You Know?...Medicare doesn't pay for Long-Term Care

### PLANNING FOR LONG-TERM CARE

Long-term care includes medical and non-medical care for people who have a chronic illness or disability. Non-medical care includes non-skilled personal care assistance, such as help with everyday activities, like dressing, bathing, and using the bathroom. At least

70% of people over 65 will need long-term care services at some point. Medicare and most health insurance plans, including Medicare Supplement Insurance (Medigap) policies don't pay for this type of care, also called "custodial care." Medicare only pays for medically-necessary skilled nursing facility care or home health care if you meet certain conditions. Long-term care can be provided at home, in the community, in assisted living, or in a nursing home. It's important to start planning for long-term care now to maintain your independence and to make sure you get the care you may need in the

### PAYING FOR LONG-TERM CARE

Long-term Care Insurance – This type of private insur- ance policy can help pay for many types of long-term care, including both skilled and non-skilled (custodial) care. Long-term care insurance can vary widely. Some policies may cover only nursing home care. Others may include coverage for a range of services, like adult

day care, assisted living, medical equipment, and informal home care. Note: Long-term care insurance doesn't replace your Medicare coverage.



### Combating the high costs of prescription (RX) drugs...



In today's world of modern medicine not only are we all living a lot longer, but the list of medications we take on a daily basis is growing every year. Prescription drug costs in many households often are the single largest expense. Generic equivalents in the US are often protected from sale until many years after they are available in other countries, making branded drugs very expensive. Go Generic - If you haven't already reviewed all your medications with your doctor for generic equivalents, do it now. Many brand drugs are prescribed because of the name association when generic equivalents will work just as well and are usually free or low-cost.

### Shop your branded prescriptions:

- a. A great resource for doing this is <a href="www.goodRX.com">www.goodRX.com</a> . Insert your zip code and RX and you will get a listing of <u>local sources</u> from Costco to CVS and coupons for savings. (I recently went to fill a RX and the cost was \$240+ for 90-days, the same RX through GoodRX with a coupon was
- b. Go north: I have used www.onlinepharmaciescanada.com for several years to fill my expensive branded drugs. My Diovan is \$35/month or \$105/90-days in the US, but a 90day prescription for the same is \$47 through OPC. Many brand drugs have generic equivalents in Canada that are not available here. The process is easy, call in your prescription, get your doctor to fax a 90-day prescription and in 2-4 weeks your medicine will arrive
- c. Contact the manufacturer of your RX, many manufacturers have programs (Nexium \$5-15/month www.purplepill.com) that can help out with expensive drugs.
- d. Depending upon your income, you can receive assistance with high cost drugs through "Low Income RX Subsidy" www.ssa.gov/prescriptionhelp

All of the above can assist you in finding better solutions and saving on your out-of-pocket RX expenses. Sometimes it is a combination of several strategies.




